2. AIPS Book Prize Awardee 2009

Siddiqa, Ayesha (2007) Military Inc.: Inside Pakistan's Military Economy. London: Pluto Press.

Ayesha Siddiqa's Military Inc. is a courageous work exposing the Pakistan military's largely invisible parallel economy; one that siphons off a sizable share of the Pakistani state's resources to benefit a select few. The work goes beyond the "national security" analysis of Pakistan's military's reluctance to relinquish control; it shows that the defense service's motivations for dominance are rather parochial. Siddiqa's theoretical framework also analyzes the role of the Turkish and Indonesian militaries, showing how other "professional" militaries can have "unprofessional" interests; this impedes the development of a vibrant democracy. Written in lucid prose, this work charts new ground in its analysis of how the Pakistan military's economic interests contribute to its imperative to gain state power while providing a theoretical framework that engages broader questions of the relationship between militaries and state power. In doing so, Military Inc. makes an important contribution to the comparative study of military-state-society relations while providing for Pakistan--both through its empirical depth and cogent analysis--a critical history of the present. It is a new and innovative work that invites exploration of the Pakistan project that extends beyond the "Muslim question" and probes the institutions that failed in delivering the promise of improvement to the people in the newly found Muslim homeland.

AIPS aims to facilitate scholarship within academe in Pakistan in various disciplines through the holding of dissertation workshops. This dissertation workshop is for doctoral students in anthropology and sociology at Pakistan-based universities, and will be run by the eminent anthropologist Dr. Kamran Ali, University of Texas-Austin, with the participation of Dr. Humeira Iqtidr, South Asia Center Fellow, Cambridge and faculty member at LUMS.

4. Pakistan Lecture Series Spring 2009

Sultan-i-Rome (March 24-April 17, 2010)

Swat: An Analysis of Political, Administrative, Socio-Political and Economic Developments: Professor Sultan-i-Rome provided a critical analysis of the situation in Swat, NWFP, by providing an historical context and elaborating on current issues in the ongoing conflict today. Swat has been periodically invaded by formidable armies, of which the present deployment of the Pakistani armed forces is an example. The situation in Swat became volatile in 2007 as both government forces and extremist factions clashed. Clashes erupted again in spring 2009, which resulted in millions of IDPs (internally displaced persons) fleeing Swat.

How to bring a Pakistan Lecture Series Speaker to your campus:

The Pakistan Lecture Series is a program designed to support academic exchange between Pakistani and US scholars and to promote field of Pakistan studies as a whole. As a part of this program a Pakistani scholar, artist, musician, etc, is invited to travel to the USA for two to four weeks and present lectures at a minimum of three US institutions that are AIPS members. **PLS speakers must be nominated by AIPS members or member institutions.** The final selection and approval of the PLS speaker is made by the AIPS Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees, and is contingent upon available funds. Approximately four PLS speakers are supported each year.

The Trustee or Member Institution who is proposing a PLS speaker will make all initial arrangements in terms of the speaker's itinerary and the lectures that they will present. This information should be filled out in the PLS Proposal Form and submitted by email to the AIPS President (jkenoyer@wisc.edu) for review by the PLS Speaker Committee and eventually the Executive Committee/ Board of Trustees.

The American Institute of Pakistan Studies would like to solicit submission of unpublished manuscripts and books published after 2005 for the annual AIPS book prize. There will be three categories of competition resulting in, a Junior Award for those who received their PhD within the past seven years (2002 or after); a Senior Award for those who received their PhD more than seven years ago (before 2002); and a Distinguished Book Award by persons without advanced degrees. Applicants for the Junior Award may submit a revised dissertation, a completed first-book manuscript that is not based on a dissertation, or a published first book. Senior and Distinguished Book Award applicants may submit a book manuscript or a published book. Unrevised dissertations and rough drafts will not be considered.
