## **Annex to AIPS Travel Grant Final Report**

I actually gave three talks in Pakistan:

- 1. 15 January 2016 "Culture and Environment in Cholistan," I.T. University of the Punjab, Lahore. This is a new extension of Punjab University, modelled after MIT, in the southernmost part of Lahore. There were twenty faculty and students in attendance, and the Q and A went amazingly well.
- 2. 20 Jan. 2016 "Structure and Method in Assessing the Deeper History of Pakistan," Hamdard University, Karachi. This was the second day of the three-day, 25th Annual, Pakistan History Conference, when we went an hour away from Karachi University to Hamdard. - 3. On the 21st, at the concluding session of the Conference, I was asked to give an assessment of the entire conference. Once I was finished, I called this 15-minute extemporaneous talk "Historical Research and Teaching in Pakistan: a Critical Appraisal," which was received with a surprising level of enthusiasm.

The positive outcomes of my trip to Pakistan is that I have a new and much expanded cohort of history colleagues in my Pakistan network of both research and teaching activities.

I met and chatted at length with Mubarak Ali, the critical gadfly of Pakistani history research and teaching.

I also discovered that historians are much more free nowadays to pursue topic areas that in recent decades were subject to censorship and repression.

There are also a cohort of younger scholars who have approached me for mentoring and encouragement, and I am doing what I can in free moments to assist them.

The talk in Lahore and the Conference in Karachi stand as the highlights of my year so far. I am grateful to the AIPS for their generous funding.
