

2021 AIPS BOOK PRIZE

Title: *The Ethics of Staying: Social Movements and Land* Rights Politics in Pakistan

Book Description: The military coup that brought General Pervez Musharraf to power as Pakistan's tenth president resulted in the abolition of a century-old sharecropping system that was rife with corruption. In its place the military regime implemented a market reform policy of cash contract farming. Ostensibly meant to improve living conditions for tenant farmers, the new system, instead, mobilized one of the largest, most successful land rights movements in South Asia—still active today.

In The Ethics of Staying, Mubbashir A. Rizvi presents an original framework for understanding this major social

movement, called the Anjuman Mazarin Punjab (AMP). This group of Christian and Muslim tenant sharecroppers, against all odds, successfully resisted Pakistan military's bid to monetize state-owned land, making a powerful moral case for land rights by invoking local claims to land and a broader vision for subsistence rights. The case of AMP provides a unique lens through which to examine state and society relations in Pakistan, one that bridges literatures from subaltern studies, military and colonial power, and the language of claim-making. Rizvi also offers a glimpse of Pakistan that challenges its standard framing as a hub of radical militancy, by opening a window into to the everyday struggles that are often obscured in the West's terror discourse.

1) American Institute of Indian Studies (AIIS) Dissertation-to-Book Workshop

This workshop aimed to help a select number of recent PhDs to re-vision their doctoral dissertations as books. Originally part of the Annual Conference on South Asia, the workshop occurred virtually. The workshop was sponsored by the American Institute of Indian Studies, American Institute of Pakistan Studies, American Institute of Bangladesh Studies, and American Institute for Sri Lankan Studies.

2) University of Michigan 10th Annual Pakistan Conference

This year's conference theme was "Religious Landscapes" and featured two days of presentations, panels, and film screening. The conference was organized by Matthew Hull, Brittany Puller, and Zehra Hashmi in conjunction with the UM Center for South Asian Studies (CSAS). The conference also included an exhibition with Director and Professor Claire Pamment regarding the contestation and articulation of gender, class, caste, and religious identity in Pakistani theatre.

3) NYU Bangladesh Conference

AIPS co-sponsored a recent virtual conference organized by South Asia NYU and the UT South Asia Institute commemorating the 50-year anniversary of the Bangladesh War of 1971. The three-day conference, "War, Violence, and Memory: Commemorating 50 Years of the 1971 Bangladesh War" was held July 1st - 3rd and featured numerous panels and discussions about Pakistani and Bangladeshi history, the war of 1971, and its implications.

4) LUMS Beginning Urdu Course

AIPS funded six faculty/administrators from community colleges or minority-serving institutions to participate in a 10-week, online course titled "Beginning Urdu I" that was hosted and facilitated by LUMS. The course was designed for learners without any previous knowledge of Urdu language and culture. The goal of this course was to provide students with the fundamentals of Urdu grammar and help them move from novice low to novice high levels in all four skills (reading, writing, listening, and speaking) using a curriculum designed by instructors experienced in teaching to foreign students. Using a communicative approach and an innovative blended curriculum, this course was conducted online by Dr. Faiza Saleem.

Summary: AIPS has selected its next cohort for the Faculty Development Seminar in Pakistan. This seminar, organized by AIPS with support from CAORC, aims to provide participants with firsthand experiences of various cultural sites and practices in Lahore, including its medieval walled city and its colonial architectural landmarks, as well as facilitating meetings with local scholars, artists, and others. Participants are faculty members or administrators of a community college or minority-serving institution, who seek to provide a global perspective to their students. This program is currently set to occur in December of 2021.

UPCOMING AIPS EVENTS

1) The Community College Collaborative Workshop

Location: Lahore and Islamabad, Pakistan

Date: December 2021

Dr. Paul Edleman (Sauk Valley Community College), Prof. Farah Habib (Bristol Community College), and Dr. Robert Soza (Mesa Community College) have been awarded a grant for "The Community College Collaborative," a professional development initiative to take place at Lahore University of Management Sciences in Lahore, Pakistan. Drs. Edleman and Soza along with Prof. Farah Habib will work with community-college level faculty in Pakistan to develop an integrated humanities and social sciences curriculum for first- and second-year students. Pakistan is piloting a program to model community colleges on Western models geared toward offering twoyear degrees and certificates. Similarly, in the US, there is an interest in the humanities and social science departments to globalize curriculum and improve students' global competency. By working together, faculty from both countries will develop curricula that address local concerns and prepare students for success in the workforce and university programs. The program will host a two-and-a-half-day in-person workshop at the Lahore University of Management Sciences (LUMS) with the guiding theme of interdisciplinary integration of the humanities and social sciences in community college pedagogy and curriculum. Following the workshop, the US participants will engage with Government Officials and University Administrators to discuss the future and development of community college programs in Pakistan.

2) Research Encounters in Pakistan

Location: Metropolitan State University of Denver, USA

Date: Spring of 2022

As a minority-serving and mostly undergraduate institution, MSU Denver will host an academic discussion on Pakistan, with conversations about research opportunities, study abroad opportunities, scholarly exchange, and Pakistan's cultural milieu with faculty and students. The conference, organized by Dr. Sanaa Riaz, will host Dr. Kathryn Besio from the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, a minority-serving institution. Dr. Besio's talk, from the perspective of her area of expertise, Geography, will be followed by a discussion by Dr. Joel Gordon, Professor of History of the Middle East and Islamic Studies at the University of Arkansas. Due to COVID-19 this event has been postponed until the spring of 2022.

3) Before and Beyond Typography: Textual Production in Global and Multimodal

Perspective Location: Virtual

Date: TBD

This series of virtual manuscript workshops explores the history of reproductive text technologies from a global, multimodal perspective. The event brings together both established and emerging scholars. It will track the dynamic interplay between technological change and non-typographic printing in South Asia, East Asia, the Middle East, and North Africa; and the vitality of non-typographic publishing networks from the early modern era through the present. Dr. Thomas S. Mullaney of Stanford University and Dr. Andrew Amstutz of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock are organizing this series.

4) Pakistan and Partition Through Bengali Eyes: Elias's Khoabnama

Location: Bangladesh Date: August 2022

The workshop, facilitated by Dr. Naveeda Khan at Johns Hopkins University, will host twelve participants. They will present and discuss one another's papers on Akhteruzzaman Elias's novel, Khoabnama, to produce pithy pieces and academic work on a figure richly deserving of more engagement. Graduate students working on related topics will be involved in the conference. The university will also advertise it to the broader public.

5) Writing Pakistan: Literature, Nationhood, and Identity

Location: Virtual **Date:** October 2021

This AIPS-funded panel will take place at the 2021 Annual Conference on South Asia and is organized by Mushtag Bilal, PhD candidate at Binghamton University. The panel seeks to investigate the relationship between Pakistani literature, nationhood, and identity by bringing together established scholars and graduate students working on Pakistani literature. Some of the questions this panel aims to explore: How is Pakistan as an Islamic nation imagined through literature? What kind of discourse of an "Islamic nationhood" emerges out of Pakistani Urdu literature? Who is a "Pakistani writer?" What role do Pakistani literatures play in crafting or contesting a "national identity?" How are minorities portrayed in Pakistani literatures? Two scholars, Muneeza Shamsie and Nasir Abbas Nayyar, will join from Pakistan to participate in the panel. U.S. scholars on the panel include Cara Cilano, Ambreen Hai, Ulka Anjaria, Sameera Abbas, Rajendar Kaur, Zain Mian, and Mushtaq Bilal.

6) Linguistic Anthropology: Mobilizing Key Concepts in the Context of Pakistan

Location: Lahore. Pakistan Date: December 2021

The workshop, facilitated by Dr. Matthew A. Cook, Dr. Gwendolyn Kirk, and Dr. Elizabeth Keating, convenes an interdisciplinary and inter-university group of junior Pakistani faculty to introduce them to concepts from the theoretical toolkit of linguistic anthropology. The workshop addresses a knowledge gap about linguistic anthropology in Pakistan, where linguistics—instead of focusing on the country's rich language

landscape—prioritize ESL and Chomsky's generative grammar. It is similarly marginal in Pakistani anthropology, which is mostly limited to the discipline's socio-cultural subfield. Due to this double "blind spot" in linguistics and anthropology, the workshop will benefit Pakistani participants from both of these disciplines. Participants from other disciplines will also profit from it by exposing them to linguistic anthropology's concepts for understanding language, culture, and society.

7) Emerging Scholars in Pakistan Studies Symposium

Location: Madison, WI, USA

Date: October 2022

AIPS is planning to hold its third Emerging Scholars in Pakistan Studies Symposium at the Annual Conference on South Asia in 2022. This one-day pre-conference is expected to bring together emerging scholars who are based in the social sciences and the humanities primarily in the US academia. A call for applications will be announced during the summer of 2022. AIPS encourages abstracts from (but not restricted to) disciplines such as anthropology, sociology, political science, history, literature, religious studies, art history, music, women studies, film and communications studies, etc. Graduate Students who are enrolled in a PhD program in a US academic institution and have ABD status, especially those writing their dissertations are encouraged to apply. Post-Doctoral candidates who completed their PhD in or after 2018 are also encouraged to apply.

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
